

WARSAW'S JEWISH HISTORY TOUR



Before the World War II Warsaw was one of the biggest Jewish community in Europe. Among many others, Warsaw was home to the Noble-winning writer Isaac Bashevis Singer, pianist and composer Władysław Szpilman and the outstanding actress Ida Kamińska. Although Jewish heritage was almost annihilated by the Nazi in 1944 when almost all of central Warsaw became a field of rubble, there are still several hidden traces of Jewish culture and history. We invite you to the Museum of the History of Polish Jews, which provides a unique entree into the Polish Jewish experience, narrating the 1,000 years of Jewish life in Poland. During the tour you will see the remnants of the Ghetto's Walls, the Umschlagplatz where Jews were gathered for deportation to the Treblinka extermination camp, the monumental Memorial of the Heroes of the Warsaw Ghetto honoring those who died during the Ghetto Uprising in 1943 (where the German chancellor, Willy Brandt, unexpectedly knelt down in 1970).

The Tour includes: professional tour guide service, entrance to Museum of the History of Polish Jews. Please note that tour is walking.

By bus:

111, 180 - bus stop: Nalewki Muzeum (ca 200m away from the Museum entrance); both lines are served by low-floor vehicles)

By tram:

18, 15, 35 Muranów stop (ca 500m away from the Museum entrance)

17, 33, Anielewicza stop (ca 500m away from the Museum entrance)
